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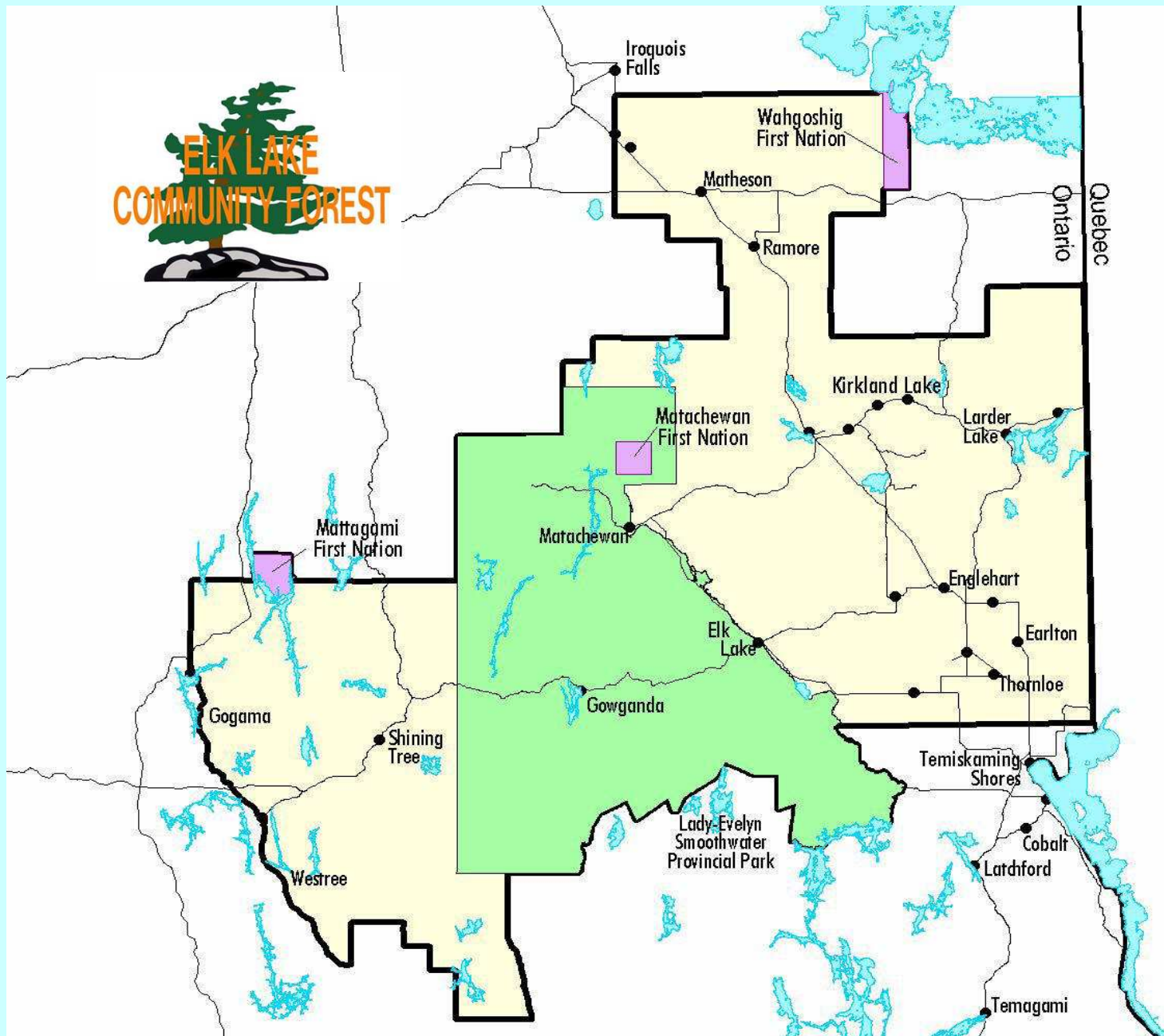

## The Landbase

- Elk Lake Crown Management Unit
- Approximately 450,000 hectares
- One organized municipality
- Borders on Temagami Area/District
- Active forestry operations and sawmilling since J.R. Booth
- Boreal and Transition Forest



## The Landbase (cont'd)

- Established “semi remote” tourism sector
- Historical use by Temagami First Nation and Matachewan FN
- Mining origins...limited by Land Caution and economics of the 80's/early 90's



## Origins

- Most of Kirkland Lake and Temagami District were Crown Management units up until mid 90's
- Controversy in Temagami around land claim, park creation/expansion
- Wood supply issues including shipment of roundwood to Quebec mills
- Growing pressure on forest



## Origins (continued)

- 1991 Model Forest Program Request for Proposals
  - Strong focus on enhanced silviculture, and community tenure (short listed but not selected)
- 1991 Community Forest Program
  - Focus on tenure reform (preceded “Robert Carmen” and establishment of Sustainable Forest Licences) Selected as one of four sites





## Mission Statement (1991)

*To promote the continued economic viability of local communities that depend on the area for their livelihood through the implementation of Sustainable Forest Practices*



## Objectives

Secure Local Administrative and Decision Making Authority

Accelerate the development of sustainable forestry

Promote the economic viability of local communities

Secure the permanance of the Community Forest



## Evolution- Part I

- Silviculture, Conflict Resolution, Data collection, “towards community tenure”
- Funded by Provincial government
- Government funding ended in 1995



## Evolution- Part I

- Two key components:
  - Partnership Arm
  - Operational Arm



## Evolution- Part I

- 1994-1996 “Incubation” of cooperative SFL
- Important role as Local Citizens Committee for the development of the 1996 Timber Management Plan for the Elk Lake Crown Management Unit
- Significant role with respect to conflict resolution
- Input into the Crown Forest Sustainability Act



## Evolution- Part II

### ➤ Self-funded

- Silvicultural contractors
- Fire suppression/support
- Continued role as LCC for the Elk Lake Portion of Timiskaming Forest
- Line marking as compliance program increased



## Evolution- Part III

➤ “Privatized” in 1997



## Evolution- Part IV

- Company dissolved and operations reverted to ELCF
- MNR eliminated role as LCC as plans were consolidated
- Silviculture, Technical and Training Services re-started
- Advocacy during Lands for Life Process





## Evolution- Part V Current Status

- Advocacy
- Defacto “business incubator”
- Community/business development
- **PROTECT ACCESS TO THE FOREST**
- Close relationship with SFL, Industry, Development Agencies



## Lessons Learned

- Be Flexible
- Not a “one size fits all” solution
- PROTECT ACCESS TO THE FOREST
- Relationships are critical!
- Involvement costs \$\$\$\$\$.. And TIME...need strong Council support
- Private ownership has some positive aspect
- Community management of the forest is not necessarily good management
